Years 3 and 4 travelled to Hadleigh Country Park to learn more about their History topic (Year 3 – Stone Age/Iron Age and Year 4 – Romans). The children had the opportunity to become archaeologists as they dug up interesting artefacts that taught them more about the historic era they were from. Some children found bits of pottery, parts of weapons and even bones!

After looking at some of the pottery dug up from the ground, the children were then able to make their own clay pots. They learnt a lot about the Celts and Romans with a detailed talk inside a roundhouse.

During the week the class focused their learning on a story called 'Back to Earth with a Bump'. The story followed a little boy called Hal, who had been sent on a mission to find the sun. The class were able to do lots of writing and other activities in connection with the story,



such as packing a backpack to take to space, designing their own planets and writing postcards to their friends and family. They also learnt about why we have day and night and how the planets orbit the sun.

Making Learning Fun in Year 6

Year 6 pupils have been enjoying some novel experiences in the classroom recently.

Area and Perimeter Year 6 learnt how to find the area and perimeter of rectangles by creating their own rectangles on the floor. They then measured the sides and used the measurements to calculate the area and perimeter of the shapes. Working in pairs, they practised their teamwork as well as their Maths.

Virtual Reality Workshop As part of Science Week, pupils were fortunate enough to travel to space via a visiting virtual reality workshop! They enjoyed learning about the different planets and moons, and experiencing what it is like to be in space!

Oreo Phases of the Moon Following on from the virtual reality workshop, Year 6 learnt about the different phases of the moon and the recreated them using Oreo cookies! They had to demonstrate they understood the difference between a waxing moon, waning moon, full moon and a new moon, which they were able to do in a delicious way!





School Councillors Meet the Mayor

Visiting Chocolate Workshop

On Wednesday 21 March Years 5 and 6 went to the chocolate workshop. We went to the Year 6 classroom to do the workshop. Our teacher was Jennifer and she wanted to teach us the interesting and fascinating history of chocolate and where if came from. After Jennifer introduced herself to us she taught us the process of making chocolate. First the coco beans (which you can eat) are planted. After a year the tree should have formed these big rugby ball sized fruit. After that they get the coco beans and dry them out. Then they dry out all the coco beans on mats outside in the sun. After that they use a special machine to crush the coco beans and pour them into moulds.



There are different types of chocolate, some examples are milk, white and dark. Jennifer taught us how to taste chocolate properly, like at the awards. I found it very fun and enjoyable. Our workshop taught us how the Mayans enjoyed and used chocolate and how they made hot chocolate. I enjoyed learning about its history and I learnt how it is made. We also learnt that the Mayans were not the first people to discover chocolate and that it dates back to 3500BC. People in history have used the coco bean for medicine, fruit and even currency!

Learning is Sweet in Year 4

Learning about Perimeter To put their learning on perimeter into action, Year 4 were given photographs of themselves and had to measure around the sides in order to calculate the perimeter. They then used this information to help them carefully measure and cut out borders to frame the photos ready for display on Open Morning. They were given a variety of shaped photos such as hexagons, parallelograms and trapeziums, making the task slightly more challenging for some. In addition to this, they were also working with decimal measurements. The children collaborated really well to produce both accurate and creative Maths work.


The Digestive System This term Year 4 started their new Science topic 'Animals Including Humans'. The class were able to construct the digestive system and name all the key parts, which included some challenging vocabulary such as the 'oesophagus' and 'duodenum'. Following this, they then wrote their own storyboard about a piece of food and its journey through the digestive system, one of the characters they came up with was 'Captain Corn' who started his adventure at the terrifying teeth - you can ask the children if you want to know where his adventure ended!

Making Constellations After learning about some of the famous constellations, Year 4 carefully recreated them using raw spaghetti sticks and mini marshmallows. Some of the constellations such as Leo and Canis Major were quite tricky to make, but lots of the children succeeded! Following this, they learnt about the different star signs and their constellation patterns. Some children decided they believed in what their star sign said about them, whereas others weren't too convinced!

Year 4 use Space Themed Confectionery in Maths In line with the theme of 'Space' in Science Week, Year 4 used sweets and chocolates named after Space related elements (Mars, Galaxy, Milky Way, Starburst and Starmix) to help them with their learning in Maths. The starter of the lesson was for children to find out the meaning of or facts about the different space features by using a dictionary or what they had learnt from earlier on in the week. After this, they then had to find out how many grams of sugar was in each packet. They used










these decimal figures to answer worded problems asking them to find the total amount of sugar in all the sweets put together and finding the difference between the most and least sugary. Although lots of children were shocked about the amount of sugar in the treats, it did not stop them from eating them after the hard work had been done!

Year 5 have had an exciting time in lessons this half term. Miss Stone and the pupils are keen to share what they have been doing with our readers.

Special Books In RE, we are learning about Sikhism and their special book, the Guru Granth Sahib. We learnt that Sikhs show it great respect as they believe it is the Sikhs' last Guru, which means Great Teacher. We thought about the different special books in our own religions and heard about other people's religious books and how those special books are treated. We then shared with the class a little speech about a book that is special to us and why and how we treat it. We learnt a lot about different religions and thought about why books are so special.



World Book Day Like the rest of the Juniors, Year 5 celebrated World Book Day on Thursday 1 March with a range of interesting activities. We dressed up as our favourite book characters and then staged a photoshoot to record our wonderful costumes. We read to each other using facial expressions and body language to enliven our readings, having first watched a video on how to tell stories. Later the class walked to Chingford Library to enjoy the range of books there, and also to enjoy the snow on the walk there and back. We finished the day by making World Book Day celebration posters. After his accident he was motivated to take on athletics; he even said that the car crash made him more inspired to pursue his dreams!

International Women's Day Assembly

On 8 March Normanhurst School celebrated International Women's Day with an assembly looking at the history of the feminist movement. The presentation, led by Ms G Parry (Head of Senior English) covered the three waves of the feminist movement, looking at the start of the movement at the beginning of the 20th century, moving through the last 100 years and ending on what feminism means in our modern world.

As a part of the assembly Yasmine in Year 11 took part in a Q & A session with Miss Parry in which she spoke about a teenager's perspective on the idea of Feminism.



Year 11 Geography Field Trip

On Tuesday 13 March, Year 11 Geography pupils embarked on an insightful day to the heart of a new east London – the Queen Elizabeth Olympic Park. In conjunction with the Field Studies Council, pupils took part in the 'Challenges in Cities' course, an urban geography course focused on regeneration in line with their syllabus requirements for urban fieldwork.

The class set off from the Aquatic Centre on foot to compare two areas, the more deprived area of Carpenter's Estate, and East Village as a regenerated area. The Year 11s undertook the task by collecting



primary data through various fieldwork techniques. This included pupils taking photographs of housing, transport links, and social aspects of the areas as a log, and keeping a tally of services such as schools, health centres, etc, present in the sample area. Splitting into smaller groups using a random sampling map for East Village, they conducted a building quality survey and crime index.

Pupils were able to develop a case study of Stratford, London, gaining an overview of the scale and structure of a major city. They investigated ways of life and contemporary challenges that affect urban change including deprivation, housing, transport, infrastructure and development. Their experience on the day enabled them to consider the location, including connectivity and importance to the City.



Science Week

To celebrate National Science Week Miss Wren and Miss Razzak held a Science assembly with an interactive guiz looking at everything from broccoli to cocktails under the microscope!

All pupils were introduced to the National Science Poster Challenge – an opportunity for pupils to engage with the topic of 'Exploration and Discovery'. The top five entries will be submitted to the competition at the end of the term.

Finally, what everyone was waiting for – an experiment. Miss Wren created a purple explosion using Potassium Permanganate and

Glycerine, followed by a crowd pleasing show of burning a five pound note in a mixture of Ethanol and Water. Don't worry, the money wasn't damaged by the pyrotechnic charade!



GCSE Drama Performance Exam

On Monday 26 February, Year 11 GCSE Drama students performed their scripted play to an invited audience and examiner from AQA at Redbridge Drama Centre. Group 1 performed extracts from 'My Mother Said I Never Should' by Charlotte Keatley and Group 2 performed extracts from 'Lilies on the Land', a verbatim theatre by The Lions Part.

Both groups performed their extracts with conviction, successfully using a variety of acting skills. We hope the examiner was just as impressed as the audience was.


Normanhurst Sports Report
