The children have been learning all about spiders in class, as their focus story was 'The Very Busy Spider' by Eric Carle.



The class had one image that was cut into twentyfour pieces to create one large piece of art work. All the children and the adults completed a piece to create the image. They focused on ensuring all the pieces had lots of different patterns and that they were all unique. It was really interesting to see how all the different patterns worked so well as a whole.





Junior Class Assemblies

The Spring Term brings the opportunity for Junior parents to see their children present their class assemblies on a range of topics.

Year 2G decided to do their class assembly about recycling, as this was a topic that they had learnt about in Science and then felt passionate about spreading the message. They read the story of the Messy Magpie and realised how important it was to recycle and not leave rubbish behind. Once they had done more research, the children discovered how simple changes could make a lot of difference to the environment around them. 2G really enjoyed retelling the story and teaching others about the importance of recycling. They have taken this a step further by actively recycling in class all the paper they use, which is guite a lot! The children hope that this will inspire other classes to also begin to recycle.

For their class assembly, Year 3 studied the book 'The Lion Inside', which told the story of a little mouse who wanted to be big and strong, and felt the way to do that was to have a loud roar. He soon realises that it was all about how he felt inside, which would give him the confidence to feel strong. Year 3 practised incredibly hard for their assembly and ended their performance with their own rendition of 'Roar' by Katy Perry. They made Mr Grant very proud with how well they performed!

After discussing different styles of learning in PSHE, Year 4 were inspired to do their assembly based on this. They acted out a story in which a pupil had a deflated attitude towards their learning because they struggled; however once they spoke to someone about it and asked for some help, there was a much more positive outcome. The assembly ended with a key message of trying our best and never giving up. They did a fantastic job of promoting such a positive attitude towards learning through their acting, singing and dancing.







Well done to all the pupils who presented these entertaining and informative assemblies. Class assemblies are continuing in the second half of term.



Fruit and Veg Journeys

Year 3 visited the local Tesco to investigate where the fruit and vegetables we eat are produced and how far they travel to get to us. They found some cherries that had flown from Chile, avocadoes from Spain and spring onions from Senegal! The class then were able to use the self-checkouts to buy some of the fruit and vegetables they found. Once they got back to school, the class then plotted all of these items onto a world map to see how far the food had travelled to reach their plates. The class were amazed at how far some foods have to travel so we can buy them!



Year 2 Trip to Epping Forest Field Centre

On Monday 11 February all of Year 2 travelled to Epping Forest to extend their learning about 'Living Things and their Habitats', a topic they have been learning about in Science this term. The day began with the children doing some pond dipping. They found some very interesting creatures such as a newt, greater waterboatman, phantom midge larva, dragonfly nymphs and many more. They learnt about how these animals live in the water and how they are especially adapted to live in that environment.

Year 2 also played a great drama game that involved recreating the different creatures in groups, it was quite funny. After lunch the children continued their mini-beast search by focusing on the forest, and again were able to find lots of different creatures such a millipede, slugs, worms and a golden beetle. They then played another game where the group leader, Hannah, described a mini-beast and everyone had to run to the correct habitat. Lastly Year 2 did some work on food chains.

Uniform Bill in Year 6

In a recent Year 6 PSHE lesson, the class looked at how a bill is composed and what stages it goes through in order to be considered as the law.

In class, pupils prepared the various stages through which the bill had to pass, such as being debated in Parliament and going before the Queen.

The bill was about the freedom of uniform and, after extremely heated debates at different stages, the Queen agreed to give her Royal Assent if some changes were to be made.

Stories from Other Cultures

Years 3 and 4 have started their English topic of 'Stories from another culture'. They will be writing their own Caribbean style story with references from a chosen Caribbean island! To start the topic off, the children listened to a Chinese New Year story, 'Dragons in the City', and then acted out parts of the story by using freeze frames. The children thought about how to encapsulate key moments from the story and produced some lovely freeze frames.



Mayan Learning in Year 5

The Year 5 pupils have been learning about how the Mayan civilisation was ruled and its social hierarchy. The children had a comprehension style task about the Mayan laws and ruling during this time. After this they then played 'Mayan Top Trumps'. They had cards with all the different roles/jobs that were around in the Mayan times, these were equivalent to different points that linked to their social status. Kian in Year 6 has decided to boost a healthy February among his peers by promoting the 'Fizz Free Feb' campaign in the Juniors. He did this by preparing and delivering a presentation in different year groups.

Kian also designed and made a display about the amount of sugar in drinks that children and young adults may be drinking regularly. This ranged from water to flavoured milk and also included some regular brands of fizzy drinks.

Many adults were shocked to see how much sugar there is in different drinks which they consume daily!

Kian explained his idea. "I wanted to show children how much sugar they were consuming with these drinks because they do not really realise this. You wouldn't really think that a carton of flavoured milk, which says "school compliant" on the packaging, includes 19.4g of sugar! I'm hoping to help children realise how much sugar they are drinking and help them save their precious teeth and health!"

Pupils went to the Globe's education centre for a workshop on playing Shakespeare's characters, and a few even gave a quick performance! Thankfully no one broke a leg...



Science in Practice

Year 10 have been studying the topic of Photosynthesis in their Biology GCSE lessons. As part of this topic, they were expected to complete a practical investigating starch stores in leaves. They used lodine to test variegated leaves for evidence of leaves storing glucose in the form of starch. Pupils have also been carrying out required practicals this term, including investigating 'The Effects of Light Intensity on the rate of Photosynthesis'.

Also this term, pupils in Year 8 have been studying the Chemistry topic of 'Reactions'. They have carried out many practicals where they have had the opportunity to investigate different types of reaction. One practical lesson saw them investigate the combustion of different fuels. Pupils were able to compare the rate of combustion between ethanol, propanol and a small candle. Year 8 were measuring the temperature change in the water to compare the efficiency of these fuels.





7E Assembly on Kindness

7E presented an assembly to the seniors on the theme of 'Random Acts of Kindness.' The form group had researched the impact of being kind, not just on themselves as individuals, but also on their friends, families and communities. 
Oak-Tree Summer Ball

Year 8 pupils have been developing sculptural vessels in response to their theme of 'Surface and Pattern'. They have been researching and responding to the work of two contemporary ceramists, Phoebe Cummings and Anne Castrano. Pupils have had the opportunity to explore how to refine and develop their two dimensional designs into three dimensional sculptural forms.



Year 9 Bag Designs

For their textile design brief in DT this term Year 9 had to 'Design and make a bag to be sold in a gallery shop, inspired by the artist Yayoi Kusama'. Pupils researched the artist and made visual responses to help them develop an understanding of the artist's aesthetic. They considered the products that galleries sold, and why they sold them. Year 9 then used this research to help them design their bags, using a range of key textile techniques, including tie-dye, appliqué and pattern cutting.
