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Reception Get Creative

The Reception children have created a beautiful Winter display based on the story of The Gruffalo's Child. For the background, the children all put wellie boots on and walked over the piece of paper with paint. They independently created some beautiful snowflakes using pipe cleaners and beads. Mrs Job happened to come in and saw them making the snowflakes, and the children made her a snowflake which she wore as a brooch on her jacket. They finished the display by creating the Gruffalo's child using finger printing with paint.

Reception also had a very exciting afternoon in the Art room with Miss Parrott and Miss Georgie, creating winter themed artwork. They were given all the body parts to create a winter bunny. First, they had to lay out the bunny how they would like to have it. Then they used wax crayons to decorate it using different techniques to make it look like fur. They then used water colours to go over the top and see the amazing effect when you paint over wax crayons. They finished it by sticking all the body parts together to create a beautiful winter bunny.



The children also collaborated to create some snowballs by

scrunching up pieces of paper and attaching them to a piece of string which is now hung up in our classroom as part of our lovely winter display. Well done children for all your hard work!

Year 1 History Detectives

Year 1 used their super detective skills when they went for a walk along Station Road for their History topic 'Shops and Toys from the Past'. The children were very observant and pointed out clues to show which shops were older and which were modern. They spotted shops called Robins, Shaws and Wilsons and thought they may be named after the families that first owned them. A couple of children spotted dates on the shop fronts which indicated when the shops may have first started. The class observed that Shaws had goods on display



outside like some older style shops. Children also spotted that outside Tesco there was a modern traffic light system signalling green for customers to enter and red for them to wait outside.

Hunting Nouns and Adjectives

Year 1 love their SPaG (Spelling, Punctuation and Grammar) lessons, especially when they go outside for to learn. Making the most of the advice to use the outdoors as a classroom as much as possible, they went on a 'Noun Hunt' in the large playground. Having learned that nouns are the names of things, they identified examples of common nouns and wrote and drew the examples they found.

Then a few days later, they went on an 'Adjective Hunt' in the Early Years playground. Pupils looked closely at some nouns and then carefully described them using lots of exciting adjectives. Their favourite adjectives were bumpy, massive, peachy, disgusting and smelly... !





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Year 2 Christmas Preparations

Christmas Art This half term, the children have thoroughly enjoyed using a range of techniques and media to create Christmas Art masterpieces. The children particularly enjoyed designing their own winter scenes. After mixing a few shades of blue and purple, they painted their background. The following lesson, the children used black card and oil pastels to create their penguins.

Kelly chose to create a family of penguins in her winter scene, and said "I really enjoyed using just a few colours of paint but creating so many different shades. I am really proud of how my winter scene turned out."

The children have also explored wax resistant art; they used a crayon to draw snowflakes and then painted over the top with watercolour. Noah-Hussain said, "I couldn't believe it when I painted over the top of the crayon and the paint moved away from the snowflake. It was so cool!"

Christingles In RE this half term, Year 2 have been learning more about the Christmas Story and why it is important to Christians. Caitlin summarised what they have covered in some of their lessons: "We learned that Christmas is important to Christians because it is a time to celebrate Jesus' birth. Jesus was the Son of God and he was sent to Earth to help save it and make it a better place. He taught the people to be kind in stories like The Good Samaritan."

Pupils also discussed how Christians prepare for Christmas during Advent. The children particularly enjoyed creating their own Christingles and learning about what the different parts represent. They also found it interesting to discover more about what other countries do during Advent. For example, Enis learnt that "In Germany, the children put their shoes outside on the 6th December and when they wake up there are sweets in their shoes."





Year 5 Festive Art



Year 5 have had a Christmas theme for their Art lessons this half term. They have been widening their art skill set through a variety of lessons to create some lovely Christmas items.

Over the past few weeks, they have used 3D models to create snowmen, used Hamma beads to create Christmas patterns and characters, created Christmas trees and holly wreaths using hand painting, learnt about and made their own Christingles and used collaging to create Christmas cards for their friends and family.

They certainly have been busy and are in a very Christmassy mood as we approach the end of term.





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Oak-Tree Challenge

Lots of children are enjoying completing their Oak-Tree Challenge award. There are Bronze, Silver and Gold awards and the children have to complete different challenges to complete each award. Even with the current difficulties and restrictions, the children have still been eager to take part and have shown great enthusiasm.

Some children have adjusted the residential challenge to camping in the garden, putting up the tent, cooking on a fire and spending the night outside.

It was lovely to see some of the Junior pupils collaborate to plan and run a fundraising event selling homemade cakes outside the front of their house. Dylan, John, Jasmine, Elizabeth and Nina sold over forty spooky cupcakes and tasty breads.

One of the challenges also involves the children participating in an outdoor pursuit for a day. It has been wonderful to see the children enjoying the great outdoors, trying sailing, canoeing and cycling.



Investigating Respiration

While not all Science lessons produce flashes and bangs, children are often impressed with practical demonstrations, and a recent Year 8 lesson on the workings of the respiratory system was no exception. Mrs Jayaram was able to illustrate the topic of 'Investigating Gas Exchange' using a lamb's pluck (internal organs of the chest cavity).

In her account of the lesson, 8B student Roxy described feeling the lamb's heart as "weirdly cool" and said it was "surprisingly heavy". She was also surprised to learn that the heart is situated behind the lungs rather than at the front of the ribcage.

The pupils also learnt about the movement of air during respiration, from the nose into the trachea, then the bronchus and finally the alveoli (air sacs). They had the opportunity of witnessing how the lungs inflate when we breathe in. The pupils were both disgusted and amazed at the same time!

Year 7 Theatrical Puppets

After a very busy term exploring a wide range of Art and Design, Year 7 are coming to the end of their DT project to 'Research, Design and Make a Theatrical Puppet'.

The classes have explored the work of the Irish theatre group Macnas, who use puppetry to create visually stunning spectacle.

The pupils also researched folklore and fairy tales to inspire their own creations, and they then used willow and papier maché to bring them to life!









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Normanhurst Sports Report

Golf Club Golf Club is back! Starting in January our school golf club is resuming (provided the COVID situation remains the same and the driving range is open). This club is open to any pupil from Years 4-11. We spend the winter practising at Chingford Driving Range. In the summer term pupils then go to a local golf course to put into practice the skills they have learned and honed at the range. At the end of the summer, there is an inter-house and individual golf competition where trophies and prizes are awarded.

Lockdown Athletics at Lee Valley Athletics Centre We have been so fortunate that Lee Valley Athletics track allowed us to come and use the centre during the lockdown for our curriculum PE lessons. We have had some excellent sessions there over the past month.

Junior pupils took part in a Mini-thon. This is a four-event competition consisting of a 60m sprint, a 600m longer run, long jump and a howler throw. All Years 3-6 pupils took part in their lessons, and those who performed exceptionally well will come home with Gold, Silver or Bronze certificates based on the standard set by the English Schools Athletics Association for each event. Our individual winners in each event will also receive medals. Well done everyone, there were some really excellent performances. We are now in great shape for the summer athletics season.

Seniors also took part in some challenges including a Team 2020 challenge where year groups or teams were set a challenge to complete 202.0 kilometres using the bikes, cross trainers and track at Lee Valley. They also had to complete a rep challenge where they had to perform a total number of squats, lunges, press-ups, dips, and burpees that added up to 202.0. We were really impressed with the determination our pupils showed in order to complete their challenge.

Ultimate Frisbee For a bit of end of term fun pupils in Years 7 and 8 had a go at a new sport, Ultimate Frisbee. They soon realised that the skills required to make a frisbee go where you want it to are far more complex than one would think!

PE Kit Reminder Please remember that pupils must have their legs covered during the school day with either plain navy/black skins or the school tracksuit. All pupils must have their school tracksuit as part of their uniform on PE days. If they get muddy or wet this will ensure they have something clean and dry to wear after the lesson.
