RECEPTION HOME LEARNING NEWS

The children in Reception have enjoyed a variety of different activities during their home learning. The activities have been based on a different book each week. These have included *Handa's Surprise*, *The Tiger Who Came to Tea* and *Harry and the Bucketful of Dinosaurs*.

The form time sessions have been filled with story time, yoga, mindfulness, scavenger hunts, philosophy, short Art activities, fun and games which have ensured the children are ready for the day ahead.

The children have completed some wonderful English work. They have all been working on their formation of letters which are looking amazing.

For one piece of English work, the children had to create questions for either one of the fruits or one of the

animals from *Handa's Surprise* which they then used in a hot-seating activity on Zoom with their friends. The children's inventive questions included 'Why do you have big

ears?' to the elephant, and 'Why do you have a spiky hat?' to the pineapple.

In Maths, the children have been looking at numbers to 20, using 10s frames and number lines to support their learning. They have also carried out some practical activities such as following a recipe, to weigh and bake some cookies, as well as weighing and ordering different fruits.

In Art, one of the favourite activities so far was

creating 'fruit friends and vegeta-pals'. The children each chose a piece of fruit or vegetable and then decorated them whilst on Zoom. The children named their

creations, which included Funny Face, Frank and Ice Cream. Pupils have all enjoyed getting creative and sharing their Art work with friends.

Reception have also had fun being Scientists! They have carried out experiments on sinking and floating as well as melting (which did include eating chocolate!) as well as some experiments linked to eggs. They have enjoyed observing

Pupils are all missing their forest walks that would normally happen every Friday in School. Each week the children have been set a 'forest walk challenge', such as looking for signs of winter. One of these challenges involved finding trees that look like animals.

During last term, the children were introduced to 'helicopter stories where they have the opportunity to tell a story about

anything to an adult who writes it down, and then the children act the story out together. Pupils have all had great fun continuing their helicopter stories from home.

The children's favourite character is 'Super Water Bottle' which is a character the children created themselves. This is Arabella's helicopter story: Once upon a time there was a Super Book who went into a dinosaur. And then super pencil came to get him out of the dinosaur. Then a hedgehog and a mouse came, they played and played until it got dark. And then they read a nice story before they went to bed. The End.









PREHISTORIC ART



Reception have been having lots of fun learning about dinosaurs! The children have each created a dinosaur using shapes they could find around their house. They made shadows using a torch, and built a new home for the dinosaurs. They even designed a new dinosaur and gave it a name. Their creativity has shone through!

Reception Class all took part and even made birdfeeders for the event from the helpful

YEAR 3 HOME LEARNING NEWS

How to Wash a Woolly Mammoth During English lessons, Year 3 have been learning about 'How to Wash a Woolly Mammoth'. They have now written their own instructions describing how they would wash their woolly mammoth and some children have even created their own model of a woolly mammoth. The children have really enjoyed learning about this topic, and with home learning, have even had the opportunity to dress-up and record themselves re-telling the story. Poppy said 'I've loved learning all about woolly mammoths and particularly enjoyed acting out the story!'.



Copper Children Year 3 have been studying about The Bronze Age and Iron Age this term and have learnt all about the process of making bronze, and why it was used to make tools and weapons. To create bronze during the Bronze Age, children would have to mine for copper which would then be mixed with tin. The children in Year 3 all chose to 'apply' for



the role of 'Copper Child', where they had to complete an application form and a video interview to share why they would be the best child for the job! Mr Grant and Miss Prebble particularly enjoyed watching the video interviews, and it is safe to say that Year 3 would make fantastic Copper Children. In addition, they have also created their own 3D models of tools and weapons that would have been used during the Bronze Age and have enjoyed sharing them with each other.

Maths Investigations Year 3 have thoroughly enjoyed their weekly Maths investigations, where they have to 'think

outside the box' to answer some challenging Maths problems. Over the past few weeks, they have been focussing on shape and measurement investigations and have even created their own non-standard units to measure items in. We had some fantastic ideas being sent in to us, including using Ferrero Rocher and toy cars to measure different items. The children are really enjoying the practical element of their learning and have shown that these investigations can be taken out of the classroom and can be solved using many different household resources! Francesco said 'I really enjoy being able to use items from my house to complete my work!'



Roy Lichstenstein Art This term, the children have been learning all about the famous artist Roy Lichtenstein, looking at some of his well-known pieces of artwork as well as experimenting with many new techniques to build on their current skills. The children

collated all their learning from the topic and created their very own pieces of artwork based around the style of pop art, which was started in New York by some famous artists including Andy Warhol, Roy Lichtenstein, James Rosenquist, and Claes Oldenburg. To create their final pop art piece, the children had to come up with their own version of ben day dots. They did this very creatively, experimenting with lots of different materials and techniques they could find, including bubble wrap, forks, cotton buds and Lego. The work produced has been phenomenal, both teachers and parents were particularly pleased with how well the children responded to the task and it was wonderful to see how much the children loved this topic. A huge well done to Year 3 for their super art work.





WINTER FUN

During the recent spell of wintry weather the Reception children really enjoyed spending time in the snow! Lots made snowmen and threw snowballs. They also had the challenge of making an ice ornament over the weekend using different natural materials. The ornaments all looked amazing and the children then observed how long it took for them to melt in their gardens.










YEAR 6 ART

This half term, children continued with their Op Art at home and used different techniques to give various effects alongside depth to their artwork. Pupils completed a hand tracing activity where they only used lines and colours to give their work a 3D effect.

For a collage, children worked on different animals and completed their collages with whatever was available at home. Their results were impressive and very creative! It was lovely to see how Year 6 children at Normanhurst paid attention to detail and took their time giving their drafts finer effects.


Until you've received it, you won't know which teacher it will come from or what book it will be! A little surprise to look forward to!


Just a general reminder that our 50 book challenge, called 'Master Reader Challenge', encourages children in every year group (Y1-Y6) to read 50 books in an academic year. The books are recorded on a template by the pupil/parent and confirmed by their teacher. This is different to their reading record books. We do not provide a 'must-read' book list, but we do encourage children to choose books that are appropriate for their age/ability to challenge themselves. The teacher may ask to replace some of the books that are on the log if they think the books are not challenging enough. If you are unsure about a book, please contact your class teacher in advance.

Children receive a certificate for every 10 books they read, with the 50th book's certificate handed at the end of the year with a Master Reader Challenge badge to be proudly worn on their blazers.

With the recent change, children will now receive a special reward after reading their 25th book. They will still receive their special book, if your child has already read their 25th book this academic year or completed the challenge. This will be arranged once we are back to school after the lockdown. Happy reading!'
