


JUNIOR NEWS














This was followed by an hour in the 'Endzone'. The pupils finished off the day with pizza. A great time was had by all, even the teachers!


This was a highly successful house trip, which will doubtless be repeated another year.

since March and they were all well prepared for the day's competition. Despite the lack of competitive experience due to Covid over the last few years, our pupils did themselves proud on the day. We had 3 pupils win their events and progress to the National Finals in Manchester. We

also had many 2nd and 3rd place results. Well done to everyone who represented the team.







London North Tennis Tournament

Bobby and Matias represent Normanhurst in the London North Tennis Tournament in the U13 boys event. They competed against mostly pupils from the year above but their quality showed and they gradually gelled more and more as the day went on, as the format was all doubles. They finished in 2nd place. Congratulations to them both.
