We then looked under some logs to see if we could find any insects that were camouflaged. We found ants, worms, woodlice and a beetle.


JUNIOR NEWS


In RE this term Year 3 have been studying Hinduism, with the focus on Diwali. The children discussed what happens, the meaning and why Hindus celebrate Diwali. They made Diva lamps from clay and then painted them in bright colours.





Early Years and Junior pupils learnt all about the celebration of Diwali, sampling some traditional Indian food including onion bhajis and poppadoms with mango chutney. They learnt some Indian dance moves and took a quiz! They loved learning about the celebration of the Festival of Light and finding out about the triumph of light over darkness. Year 4 visited the Museum of Power in Maldon as part of their Science topic on Electricity. Firstly, the children took part in a Mad Science workshop. They were shown how electricity conducts through Coca-Cola, introduced to electromagnets, and saw the power of magnets through iron filings patterns.



Next, was a tour of the on-site model village. The children were challenged to find different magical creatures (fairies and gnomes) and were treated to fairy crystals as a prize.




The children finished their day with two workshops on circuit building and investigating conductors and insulators. Before leaving the museum, they were able to start up the 91-year-old steam pumping engine called 'Marshall', which takes pride of place in the pumping station hall.





In Year 5 the children had great fun applying their place value knowledge in an engaging and exciting game of 'Nice or Nasty'. They had to use their place value knowledge to help them create the largest four-digit numbers, and the first player to reach 10,000 points won! Well done Year 5!





Year 5 have been learning about the religion of Sikhism. After learning about 'sewa', meals in the 'langar' and the eternal Guru Granth Sahib Ji, the pupils were keen to learn more about the origins of Sikhism. In their most recent lesson, they learnt about the Story of the Khalsa and the 5K's and enjoyed looking at some artefacts from the religion.

Pupils in the Early Years and Junior School celebrated Rosh Hashanah during their snack time by eating apples and honey and learning more about the celebration. They found out that Rosh Hashanah is celebrated as the New Year in the Jewish religion and that it is traditional to eat apples dipped in honey during this time to symbolise a 'sweet new year'. The pupils enjoyed learning about this celebration and trying the traditional foods.

The School Council representatives in the Years 3-6 classes delivered an exciting and informative assembly all about Parliament Week. UK Parliament Week is an annual event, spreading the word about what Parliament is, what it does and how you can get involved. The School Council representatives informed the Juniors about the details of Parliament Week, The Houses of Parliament, important people to be aware of and reminded them that they can take action and make an impact on the issues they care about. Well done to all of the representatives involved.



Black History Month

African Drumming

The students from Kindergarten to Year 6 had a fantastic time taking part in an authentic African Drumming workshop. Each group learned a range of rhythms on the djembe drums, including a traditional Ghanaian rhythm called the Kpanlogo. The children also enjoyed learning some call and response songs, as well as dancing to the African music.





Food tasting session

A group of Juniors had a taste-tingling food tasting session with the Smart Raspberry Cookery company as part of our Black History Month celebrations. Rachel shared some of her family's history about her mother, who is part of the Windrush generation. Then the children had the chance to try a refreshing smoothie made with several of the

tropical fruits that they were introduced to.



The children enjoyed seeing and learning about lots of different from fruits the Caribbean, including bread fruit, papaya, guava and prickly pear. The children also enjoyed trying a puff puff, which is a traditional Ghanaian treat.



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Gumboot Dance Workshop

As part of our Black History Month celebrations, the Junior pupils had a fantastic opportunity to learn about the history of South African Gumboot Dancing. They were



amazed to discover that dancing in gumboots originates from the South African mines, where miners expressed themselves through dance wearing gumboots. The miners would create rhythms by slapping their boots, hats and bodies, as well as using their voices and stamping. The children had a brilliant time learning a few different dance routines, and then also had the chance to freestyle to a wonderful African drumming rhythm.



Braiding Workshops

Some of the Junior students discovered more about the history of hair braiding, as part of their Black History Month learning. They had the opportunity to observe Miss Donalee create a variety of styles, including cornrows and fish tail braids. It was great to then see the children have a go at braiding some of their peer's hair too!







FIRE! Concert



Pupils in Years 3-6 took part in a rare musical theatre event organised by 'The Classical Road Show'. The event linked to the story of the Great Fire of London 1666 with music by The London Mozart Players and Guildhall School of Music Players. Leading up to the show, the pupils recapped the Great Fire of London, made costumes and learnt the songs for the performance as this was no ordinary trip! This cross-curricular music and history event enabled the pupils to participate in an interactive theatre show with live actors and an orchestra. They wore their specially made costumes as they sang their hearts out as part of the live choir. All the teachers were so proud of their efforts – well done Normanhurst pupils!

The Junior pupils have been busy writing and presenting speeches for the School Council and, new for this year, the Eco Council! After presenting their speeches, pupils voted for who they thought would represent their class for both councils. The nominees were then announced assembly with the help of the Junior School Council Prefects, Leyla and Sofia.

Year 5 had a wonderful visit to the Migration Museum, as part of their Geography unit which was focused on Migration to England. They took part in a fun workshop during which they discussed the push and pull factors that cause people to want to, or even have to, migrate from their source country. They also played a fun and interesting game called 'One Small Step Forward' where they had the chance to learn about how each of them had been involved or impacted by migration in their lifetime. Following the workshop, the children had the chance to explore the museum and learn about the life stories of many people who had migrated to England, discovering the history of the founders of many well-known and loved brands, such as Odeon Cinemas, Marmite and Jimmy Choo.







SENIOR NEWS

European Day of Languages On behalf of the Year 11 language students, Gabby, Mehrnaz, Yazmina, Salah, Owais, Yusuf, Esta, Ridoy and Ben gave a presentation about the European Day of Languages 2022. Both junior and senior pupils were guizzed about translations of famous children's book covers, which they were all able to recognize.

Gabby, Esta and Yazmina launched a whole school challenge to either write a social media post in a language other than English, share a positive message about languages and language-learning or create a video. The topics that could be included in the video were: which languages you speak, understand or are learning; you would like to learn and why; your best language learning experience - in or out of school; top tips to get better at languages. Pupils will randomly be selected amongst the participants to win House Points and chocolates.



Year 7 went on their first History trip to the Tower of London. They were treated to guided tours across all areas of the Tower including the Crown Jewels (newly returned), the Raven Enclosures, Traitor's Gate and the White Tower. This underpinned the topic being studied in Year 7 (Anglo-Saxons and the Norman Conquest) and brought to life the era focused upon in the classroom. We were fortunate to be able to speak to one of the only female Yeoman warders (Beefeater) about her experiences living and working in the tower and had time to explore the significance of the tower both throughout UK History and its importance today as a royal palace. The pupils had a thoroughly enjoyable and educational trip.



Year 9 visited the Imperial War Museum on Monday 7 November. They were involved in workshops and visited galleries pertaining to both World Wars and the Holocaust.

Personal stories are now at the heart of the new Holocaust Galleries, along with a breadth of objects and original material that help audiences consider the cause, course and consequences of this terrible period in world history. Individual stories from some of the six million Jewish people murdered in the Holocaust are told through over



2000 photos, books, artworks and letters, and personal objects ranging from jewellery and clothing to toys and musical instruments.

Pupils explored, with the help of a guide, the three core themes of persecution, looking at the global situation at the end of the First World War; escalation, identifying how violence towards Jewish people and communities developed through the 1930s; and annihilation, examining how Nazi policy crossed the threshold into wide-scale state-sponsored murder in the heart of twentieth century Europe.

Year 9, to celebrate Black History Month in French speaking countries, have learnt about dancer Josephine Baker, actor Omar Sy and former footballer Thierry Henry. They learned about French speaking countries in Africa, Europe and the Caribbean. Year 9 debated about European colonialism in Africa, post-colonialism, current events in Haiti, as well as the history of Québec. It was very interesting to see all pupils engaged, especially in asking cross-curricular questions related to history, geography and French!





Year 9, in line with our PSHE programme and 'Being Me in the World', have been learning about consent. They had a great, informative workshop on consent delivered by Jacqui King from Waltham Forest.

KS4 TRIP TO PARIS

During the October half term, Year 10 and 11 students, along with Mr Botha, Ms Kimpton and Ms Collins, went to Paris after the trip was delayed for 2 years. The pupils and teachers alike agreed it was the best overseas trip by far. On day one, we went to the Louvre, where we saw important historical artworks like the Mona Lisa. The Eiffel Tower was next on our list and was one of the most surreal experiences, especially when we went back at night to see it shine against the night sky. Whilst roaming the streets of Paris with a chocolat chaud in our hands, we came across the Arc De Triomphe, which was indescribably magnificent. Another of the highlights were the 360° views of Paris from the Montparnasse Rooftop Terrace and we all got to enjoy the experience together, which will remain a core memory for me. Disneyland Paris was on day two and we powered through the heavy rain going on all sorts of crazy rollercoasters and everyone agreed that you are never too old for the scrumptious Mickey Mouse pizzas that we devoured.


