Her books are translated into nine languages, and have been adapted for television and audio. Abie also appears frequently on TV and radio (BBC, Sky, Al Jazeera) to talk about children's literature, and is on the Board of Directors at the Society of Authors.

Our pupils had an amazing day thanks to Abie's visit and learnt about the process of writing a book, which gave them an invaluable insight into an author's world. They also came up with their own ideas for a book as well as characters! For our older pupils, Abie also talked about printing and publishing a book as well as marketing and the financal aspects of being an author.

The year 11 students completed their Ecology required practical at the Epping Forest Field Studies Council on the 8 March. They learnt about how to study populations by random and systematic sampling and also got to relax in a sunny meadow after mocks week.

STEAM Fortnight - Early Years and Juniors continued

Pupils from Reception to Year 6 enjoyed the Maths workshop at the beginning of the week, having to put their problem-solving skills to the test and work collaboratively in small groups or pairs to work out the answers. Pupils worked in their houses to earn points and many showed excellent leadership skills, as well as improving their Mathematical understanding. In Year 6, the first team to finish the code-breaking activity was Ridgeway and they completed the challenge in a record-breaking 18 minutes!













Junior pupils were racing against time to escape a 'secret location' in the BBC British Science Week 2024 Live Lesson. Pupils took part in the interactive lesson, using scientific knowledge to solve a series of invertebrate-themed tasks. The pupils even got a shout out from their teachers during this lesson!







Kindergarten have been learning about rockets. They shared their ideas and knowledge about rockets and learnt about the chemicals and gases required for rockets to take off into space. The pupils then headed to the garden for a fun experiment using Coke and Mentos to represent a rocket. Later on, the pupils built their own rockets using blocks and enjoyed a delicious rocket-themed snack to wrap up the afternoon.

Year 3 have been very creative with their STEAM knowledge and made pendulums in their classrooms. They worked in small groups and carefully followed instructions to ensure that their pendulums worked and they were all a success!

STEAM Fortnight - Seniors

Maths workshop

The senior STEAM fortnight got off to a code cracking start when year 9 took part in a maths workshop on Tuesday. They were given a locked box, which had 12 compartments to open using code cracking, co-ordinates and maths calculation which gave them the code to open each padlock. The last compartment held a key which opened the box to stop the clock. Each year group competed in houses and the overall winners were Year 8, Ridgeway house, who stopped the clock at a very impressive 28mins and 3seconds.

Architecture Workshop

On 15 March Years 7 to 9 took part in an architecture workshop. Working in teams, the pupils made pyramids or tetrahedrons that then joined together to make giant structures.







Years 7 to 10 Centre of the Cell Science Workshops

On Thursday 14 March years 9 and 10 travelled to St Marys University in London to visit the "Centre of the Cell". They attended an infection, invasion and immunity workshop where they learnt about herd immunity and pathogens. They also got the opportunity to talk to a research scientist about what her job entails. After that they entered the "Centre of the cell", a specialised pod which contained lots of hands on interactives games and demonstrations on cells and the way our bodies use specialised cells for specific functions.

On Monday 18 March years 7 and 8 also visited the "Centre of the Cell". After visiting the "pod" they attended a Snot, Sick and Scabs workshop which they found gross, but thoroughly enjoyed, and the hands on experience made learning fun.



I was particularly impressed by the 'Elephant's Toothpaste' demonstration which showed how with time, a catalyst and a mix of ingredients can lead to a breathtaking reaction.'





assembly also showcased Sayfullah's incredible work designing a soil moisture detector using Microbits and the year 9 practical on using Timelapse Photography to study plants they cloned learning about Stem Cells.

RAF Hendon Trips

On Tuesday 19 March years 7 and 8 were off to the RAF Museum in Hendon. They got the chance to experience a thrilling simulator ride where they were virtually put into the pilot's seat and experienced the view and movement of the plane as they flew through the skies. They then attended a workshop where instructor Mike talked them through the history of flight and then explained how we can survive and breathe at high altitude and how science and engineering have produced clothing and infrastructure to combat these issues. Audience participation was encouraged and even Mr Clair got involved, with Evan, year 7, demonstrating an exoskeleton made up of air tubes that stopped the effects of air pressure on our bodies. It was really funny when Mr Potato Head was filled with shaving foam and put into a vacuum and his insides became his outsides!

Finally, on Wednesday 20 March, it was the turn of years 9 and 10 to visit the RAF Museum. After experiencing the flight simulators, they had a workshop challenge to make an aerodynamic plane wing using just paper, paste and cable ties. They were shown a really cool machine which turned flimsy newspaper into strong tubes called STIXX which they then used to make a wing of an aircraft that would be rigid enough to stand alone and withstand a certain amount of weight. The winning team in Year 10 were "The Fokkers" (aptly named after the German war plane which used the tube technique to make their aircrafts lighter).

A busy fortnight, but one full of fun, learning activities and great experiences.
