EARLY YEARS NEWS

In addition to this, the children engaged in lots of fun activities linked to Eid including looking at and creating their own mehndi patterns, decorating pictures of mosques and looking at a selection of traditional clothing and decorations.

The children learnt about fasting and the word 'ifthar' and they also tried dates, as these are usually eaten when the fast is broken.

This term, the topic in the **Early Years** is 'Once Upon a Fairytale' and the children have enjoyed many fun and creative activities based on traditional stories. A particular highlight was our Department Themed Afternoon all about 'The Gingerbread Man'. The children crafted beautiful Gingerbread Men, made bridges to keep the Gingerbread Man safe from the fox and even made a yummy snack. We finished the afternoon with an obstacle course where the children had to 'run run as fast as you can' while avoiding obstacles and animals from the story.

The Reception children have also been working hard during their Literacy lessons to write alternative fairytale endings. Hermione thought of a lovely ending to her 'Gingerbread Man' story by saying: "The fox kissed the Gingerbread Man and said 'I love you'".





In maths, the **Kindergarten** children have been learning all about Numicon.

Over the last week, there have been daily activities to develop understanding of numbers where the children have been encouraged to count the physical holes in the tiles to work out which number they represent.

The class discussed the size, shape and colour of the tiles and pressed them into playdough, matched them to a puzzle and even planted them in the garden and watched them grow!

Our day 1 activities were low ropes and archery. There was lots of laughter while trying to balance on the ropes and the children demonstrated excellent teambuilding skills while helping their team mates through obstacles or to overcome challenges. During archery, pupils learnt about the techniques that contribute towards a successful aiming process and a successful shot - we even had a couple of bull's eyes! Day 2 was an exciting one with caving activities! Pupils put on their helmets and torches and entered the darkness of the Danbury caves (with the assistance of expert instructors guiding pupils through the tunnels). They were then allowed to play a round of hide and seek in the pitch-black tunnels.

We were extremely proud of our pupils, as well as their determination and participation during their residential visit to Danbury. We are looking forward to next year's already!



World Earth Day

The annual event of World Earth Day fell on 22 April. This year, the theme for World Earth Day 2024 was Planet vs Plastics. The theme aims to bring attention to the serious issue of plastic pollution and how it harms nature. The Normanhurst junior pupils celebrated the day by learning more about the special event with their teachers and creating some wonderful artwork.

Well done to Year 4, who worked together to create a World Earth Day collage.

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Junior pupils at Normanhurst School celebrated **World Downs Syndrome Day** on 21 March, a few days earlier than the official April date, by wearing mismatched socks. They learnt more about Downs Syndrome by reading a book by George Webster, from CBeebies and watching some Myth Busting videos. Pupils were then given some more information about autism and ways to include people with autism and how to make them feel comfortable in new situations.



Before Easter, Normanhurst School received an invitation to take some **Year 6** pupils to Stratford-Upon-Avon to witness their competition-winning school entry being transferred to the official Shakespeare Birthplace Trust archives to be stored alongside various (and very old!) artefacts.

Our pupils attended the centre on the day of the ceremony and joined many other pupils from around the UK. They experimented with quill and ink, made wax seals and had the opportunity to look closely at many artefacts which were up to 900 years old! They also met Marcia Williams who talked to them about how Shakespeare inspires her when she is writing her books.

As part of our Shakespeare Week celebrations, children in the Juniors were treated to a show that involved various plots and characters from different Shakespeare plays. The Globe Players were extremely informative during their performance as their narrators gave background information about each story that was being performed.

The children thoroughly enjoyed the performances from the extremely talented actors and actresses, who recited many original Shakespeare dialogues (and monologues) on stage.

Pupils in Year 1-6 visited the STEM Discovery Centre in Stevenage as part of the STEAM Fortnight celebrations. They participated in 3 activities: a workshop, a 'Mission to Mars' and had the chance to discover how and why things work in the exploration room. All the pupils had a wonderful time and all learnt about something new. The workshops were interactive and all the pupils were engaged and enthusiastic throughout. The 'Mission to Mars' was a fantastic opportunity to see the prototypes of robots that have been sent into space! The pupils also really enjoyed exploring how things work and especially giving their teachers mini electric shocks from the plasma ball!


Frankie Year 3 – The trip was really fun, I learnt lots, especially in the first room. I really liked electrocuting my friends and seeing the spark from my finger!

SENIOR NEWS

The UKMT (United Kingdom Mathematics Trust) competitions are renowned for challenging **Year 7 and 8 students** with complex mathematical problems that test their problem-solving abilities and logical thinking. Using only a HB pencil and scrap paper adds an extra layer of challenge. The multiple-choice format encourages students to carefully consider each option and apply their mathematical knowledge effectively to arrive at the correct answer.









The senior students held their own mock election for this year's **2024** Mayoral London Election.

Rather than being shown faces and parties, pupils got to vote on the basis of their policies (ideas and pledges) from individual plain manifestos, which were presented by students.

The students were given a voting slip where they needed to place a single x next to the party they thought would be the best choice for London and place it into a ballot box. Votes cast were counted by pupils, presenting a close victory for Sadiq Khan and the Labour Party ahead of the Liberal Democrats.

Year 11 were given a wonderful farewell day to begin their exam leave on Thursday 2 May. Pupils and teachers made emotional leaving speeches in their final assembly before distributing leavers' hoodies and farewell messages.





Students were then taken to the Toby Carvery at the Bald Faced Stag in Buckhurst Hill and treated to a buffet breakfast before being waved goodbye by staff.


